- Do your job to love others, with the love Jesus has given you
- Make sacrifices today for a better tomorrow
- Use our scattering for greater Kingdom impact
- Maintain integrity under trial
- Demonstrate the distinctiveness of the Christian faith
- Lament before God, but beware of grumbling
- Know that faith is not just what you say, but how you live

What's Next

Now, as we turn our thoughts to the new year before us, I want to mention a foundation stone of our movement from over 70 years ago.

In 1948, Chinese pastor Watchman Nee preached a series of messages that was published in English in 1965, under the title "The Release of the Spirit."

The sum of his message is that the outer soul (rational mind and sensory desires) of every Christian is in conflict with the inner spirit (which has been made new by Jesus Christ). This outer (self-motivated) life must be cracked and broken to release the inner life of the spirit, much like the husk of a seed must break for roots and shoots to grow.

This breaking (or, knocking out the props of human self-will) is orchestrated by God through the circumstances of our lives—pressure, frustration, disappointment, sorrow, pain—circumstances we naturally avoid or flee, but which have been designed for our benefit and growth. (Remember Joseph's explanation to his brothers, who had sold him into slavery: *"What you meant for evil, God meant for good"*?)

The Spirit Within Us

Jesus said, "If anyone thirsts, let him come to Me and drink. Whoever believes in Me, as the Scripture has said, 'Out of his heart will flow rivers of living water.' " Now this He said about the Spirit, whom those who believed in Him were to receive. (John 7:37-39)

And so, I'm humbled to introduce to you our theme for this new year: Release 2021.



This image expresses the release of the Spirit from every individual in the body of Christ.

You may well ask, When the outer shell is broken and the inner spirit is released, what is the result?

I'm going to highlight seven aspects of the Spirit's release to which we should aspire.

• Spirit of Life

For the law of the Spirit of life has set you free in Christ Jesus from the law of sin and death. (Romans 8:2)

The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of Life, bringing us spiritual life (that life which is eternal), and enlivening our everyday activities with the grace of Jesus Christ. He sets our conscience free from guilt and shame and fear, providing peace of heart and courage of faith.

• Spiritual Fruit

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. (Galatians 5:22-23)

The Holy Spirit produces the character of Christ in us, developing those fruits mentioned—seasonally now as situations warrant, and perpetually then (when Christ returns).

• Spirit of Truth

When the Spirit of truth comes, He will guide you into all truth. (John 16:13) The Holy Spirit is the Spirit of Truth, whom Jesus promised to send in His place, for we have so MUCH to learn. Before His crucifixion, Jesus said, *"There is so much more I want to tell* you, but you can't bear it now." Later, Paul wrote, *"I had to feed you with milk, not with* solid food, because you weren't ready for anything stronger." God's Spirit is our faithful Teacher, who will guide us into all the truth.

• Spiritual Gifts

A spiritual gift is given to each of us so we can help each other. (1 Corinthians 12:7) Through the Holy Spirit, God gives spiritual gifts to His people, empowering us to make a positive difference in the lives of others, spreading His Kingdom and grace throughout the world.

• Spirit's Presence

May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all. (2 Corinthians 13:14)

The Holy Spirit is the presence (fellowship) of Jesus Christ in His Church, providing comfort and confidence in any circumstance.

• Prayer in the Spirit

But you, beloved, building yourselves up in your most holy faith and praying in the Holy Spirit, keep yourselves in the love of God. (Jude 20-21)

When the Holy Spirit prompts and guides our prayers, He also empowers us with grace, whether we pray in our mother tongue or in unknown tongues. He always leads us to pray in accordance with the will of God.

• Spirit's Witness

You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you. And you will be my witnesses, telling people about me everywhere. (Acts 1:8)

The Holy Spirit gives us the power necessary to win others to the faith of Christ. To share our faith, not only with boldness and captivating clarity, but also with effective impact.

The release of these represent the sevenfold impact of the Spirit of the Lord which Christ intends to release through our lives of faithfulness.

In summation, I remind you of Paul's words to the church in Rome:

^{Romans 8:16} For His Spirit joins with our spirit to affirm that we are God's children. ¹⁷ And since we are His children, we are His heirs. In fact, together with Christ we are heirs of God's glory. But if we are to share His glory, we must also share His suffering.

¹⁸ Yet what we suffer now is nothing compared to the glory He will reveal to us later. ¹⁹ For all creation is waiting eagerly for that future day when God will reveal who His children really are.
²³ We, too, wait with eager hope for the day when God will give us our full rights as His adopted children, including the new bodies He has promised us.

The release of the Spirit is a partnership between God and His children. He cannot do it without your cooperation. You cannot do it without His grace. As 2021 begins, will you renew your pledge of devotion to Jesus Christ? To search for His presence? To listen to His voice? To watch for His signals? To follow His lead? And above all, to glorify His name in word and deed?

If so, then we may expect Him to work again as He has done in the past!

Lord Jesus, do it again, as we release Your Spirit from within us!
